Chalk and talk engagement

1. What is the engagement about?

On 28 November 2018 council assembly approved the current Council Plan stating the commitment to build a new library on the Walworth Road. The new library and Southwark heritage centre will ensure that Walworth remains a destination, and provides community facilities to meet the needs locally and for the borough. On the 22 January 2019 Cabinet agreed that Council take a lease for 250 years on the ground floor of units 145-147 Walworth Road of the Elephant Park development.

A new library with integrated heritage centre brings exciting opportunities to increase access to the Southwark collections and extend the context of both the heritage and library service. The integrated facility can explore different ways of presenting information, learning and engaging and thus provide a unique resource for Southwark's diverse communities. We want to encourage a lot of new people to this unique place and re-connect with past users.

The vision for the Walworth Library and Southwark Heritage Centre

- A flexible modern facility with a quality visitor experience where people feel they belong
- A welcoming, democratic community facility for all that amazes, inspires and intrigues
- An integrated library and heritage centre with relevant resources and fascinating stories about Southwark, its people and objects from the collections
- A place that reflects the uniqueness of Southwark which promotes inclusivity and opportunities for participation.

The community engagement for the new library and heritage centre is to facilitate community input into the project development and delivery. Our aims for the engagement are to:

- raise project awareness and input into the Walworth Library and Southwark Heritage Centre design development
- ensure that the project outcomes reflect the community's aspirations by informing and engaging with key stakeholder groups, schools and the wider community through a range of communication and engagement tools
- facilitate the two way flow of information and knowledge about the project to both internal and external stakeholders.

The engagement plan includes; Bright ideas, concept design RIBA stage 2 and detailed design stage 3.

2. The Chalk and talk engagement process

From mid September through till mid October Southwark Council with lead designers AOC undertook an engagement process to test concept ideas of the new Library and Heritage Centre on the Walworth Road and receive the communities input. The purpose of the chalk and talk consultation phase was to understand peoples priorities for the centre and receive responses to 3 options for layout and the external treatment to the service on the streetscape. These responses have informed the design to move into stage 3 of the design process. The following table notes the activities used to communicate the process and to gather information. Questions to help determine the name of the facility were also included in this stage of consultation.

All engagement followed the same format of priorities workshop and responses to presented options.

6. Chalk and talk public drop in session

Everyone was invited to attend a drop in session and talk with the lead designers and Southwark officers about the project. Display boards showed the project background and design options for discussion. The questionnaire that formed part of the online questionnaire was filled in by approximately half the visitors.

Engagement Summary

- 1. Most people thought that a portico feature created the most inspiring entrance to the library on Walworth road in comparison to a sign eyecatcher or signage banner.
- 2. The significant majority of people felt that the centre should be named in reference to its use and location rather than a personality, learning journey or the collection.
- 3. The significant majority of people felt that there should be a defined library with a distinct heritage centre, rather than an interspersed solution or a priority around performance and events.
- 4. Most people thought that the first look coming into the centre should be focussed on the library offer. Slightly less people supported a focus on events, less people wanted a changing heritage feature.
- 5. The significant majority of people supported a 'pier' type mezzanine over the square or linear mezzanines.

How has the design responded to Public consultation?

In most instances views are spread. Solutions are not clear cut, and more than one solution can be successful.

The priorities workshops where useful to discuss emerging themes, but their spread of views cannot confirm absolute priorities - only raise issues

We have taken note of the top 5 core priorities and the next 4 ambitions

Core

Books on display



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- Computer access and study desks
- Heritage project workspace
- Draft prevention lobby
- Temporary heritage gallery

Ambitions

- Community meeting room
- Highly visible civic front door
- Showcase Southwark Story
- Informal seating and event space

Whilst all priorities are key to the emerging brief, these core priorities and priority ambitions are more important to more people. Where difficult decisions need to be made in the project decision makers should be mindful of these top priorities.

- Books and study space are a greater priority than heritage display
- Temporary exhibition space is a greater priority than making a showcase Southwark story
- A heritage workspace is a greater priority than a community meeting
- A draft lobby is a greater priority than making a highly visible civic front door

The design has evolved significantly throughout the workshop process and the engagement period. The design team has aimed to best align the scheme with feedback through workshops and engagement, and through information gained in correspondence.

A mezzanine is proposed, along with a stair place event space. A flexible meeting space is provided for varied use as an extension of library activities. A heritage meeting room is also provided offering an overflow space for staff BOH activities when required.

Engaging in diverse conversation has allowed the client and design team to see the need for flexibility, and the design has become more flexible in its conception to help cope with future change. Other than the position of the mezzanine and stair-place much in the public parts are potentially adaptable by moving demountable furniture.

In response to the key engagement findings;

Most people thought that a portico feature created the most inspiring entrance to the library on Walworth road in comparison to a sign eyecatcher or signage banner.

Further investigation has been undertaken into a portico feature in front of a newly formed external lobby extension. Banner and eyecatcher options will be developed in tandem. This design element will continue to be discussed and developed before an ultimate decision on the approach.

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The significant majority of people felt that the centre should be named in reference to its use and location rather than a personality, learning or the collection.

Based on this preference Southwark will develop a preferred naming strategy.

The significant majority of people felt that there should be a defined library with a distinct heritage centre, rather than an interspersed solution or a priority around performance and events.

After testing many options the proposal is to have a defined library over ground and first floor. There is a distinct heritage space to the rear of the ground floor.

Most people thought that the first look coming into the centre should be focussed on the library offer. Slightly less people supported a focus on events, less people wanted a changing heritage feature.

The library offer is highly visible on approach through the various windows. The library is generally to the front of the building. Upon entry there are library choices to both the left and right, or upstairs, with heritage spaces straight ahead to the rear. The event space is to one side; accessible yet removed.

The significant majority of people supported a 'pier' type mezzanine over the square or linear mezzanines.

The pier and square mezzanine have both been developed throughout stage 2. The pier initially preferred for its narrow low impact soffit, but with concern over its dividing impact within the double height volume. The square mezzanine responded to this latter concern, but raised the risk of a wider soffit. Consideration of use with the client team raised better disabled access and more open circulation with the square mezzanine and a lower risk of potential antisocial behaviour. These factors supported the square mezzanine design being proposed for stage 3.

All the raw consultation data and this report will be shared as part of the design process to help understand the communities needs and make this new facility a success.
